From the Manse...

Welcome to the Christmas edition of Parish Press.

What is it that you look forward to most about Christmas? Is it family gathering together? Is it catching up with friends and loved ones, some in person and others by Christmas card? Is it the decorations, the lights and the tinsel? Is it giving and receiving gifts? Is it the Christmas specials on the TV? Is it Christmas treats and food? Is it the carols and the nativity? Is it the special feeling that the Christmas season seems to bring?

I suspect for most of us it is some combination of all of these things, with perhaps some of our memories of special Christmases past mixed in as well. Whatever it is that we look forward to at Christmas time, there is no doubting that this is a unique and special time of year.

Even in these difficult times, as folk struggle with the cost-of-living crisis, with worries about heating their homes and having enough food to eat, Christmas still remains as a special time of the year.

And that is both the problem as well as the joy of Christmas. We all want Christmas to be special, we pull out all the stops, we go over the top. We stress about getting the right presents and worry about leaving someone off our Christmas card list. We sweat over the cooking to make sure that Christmas dinner is a meal never to be forgotten. We try so hard to make Christmas special. But is all that stress, all that effort, all that worry,

really what makes Christmas special?

I was recently visiting a friend who has a 3-year-old daughter. When it came time for her to go to bed, she came and hugged us all, and then asked her dad to come and read her a story. "Which story?" he asked her. "Silly daddy," she replied, "the one with the bear." It later emerged that 'the one with the bear' was the story that she had read to her every night when she went to bed. It was her favourite. She knew every word of by heart, but it didn't matter how many times she had heard it, she still wanted to hear the story again.

I was thinking about that. I am a bit older than her (by a good few years!) but I would have to say that I agree with her thinking. The stories that mean the most to me, the books that I enjoy most, even the films that are my favourites, are not ones that I have heard or read or seen only once. They are stories that I return to again and again. The Star Wars movies are my favourites, I have watched them so many times that I know all of the words -

yet I still love to watch them. The Lord of the Rings Trilogy of books are among my favourite novels, and I try to read them again every couple of years. It turns out that the stories that mean most to me are the ones that I have heard again and again and know so well - just like my friend's little daughter.

We all know the Christmas story so well, we know of the stable and the angels, the shepherds and the wise men. We are not going to learn any new parts of the story this year. There are no new characters to reveal, no plot twists you have not heard before. The story of Jesus' birth recounts the coming of God's son in our midst. It recalls the moment that history changed. It tells of the coming of one who would ultimately die in our place and take away our sin. It speaks of the wonders that happened at his birth and assures us that because this child has come 'a light shines in the darkness and the darkness cannot overcome it'. It reveals the love of God for each and every one of us, a love that goes to any lengths. Max Lucado, one of my favourite authors, has this

to say of Christmas:

"'Can anything make me stop loving you?' asks God, 'Watch me speak your language, sleep on your earth, and feel your hurts. Behold the maker of sight and sound as he sneezes, coughs and blows his nose. You wonder if I understand how you feel? Look into the dancing eyes of the kid in Nazareth, that's God walking to school Ponder the toddler at Mary's table, that's God spilling his milk. You wonder how long my love will last? Find your answer on a splintered cross, on a craggy hill. That's me you see up there, your maker, your God, nailstabbed and bleeding. Covered in spit and sinsoaked. That's your sin I'm feeling. That's your death I'm dying. That's your resurrection I'm living. That's how much I love you"

This story of God's love, a love that pierces all our worries, hurt and despair with a shout so loud all the world can hear it – "You are loved, God Himself gives up heaven for a manger in a stable just so that He could share eternity with you", this story is truly what makes Christmas special.

So I hope you have a wonderful Christmas. I hope you get the presents you want, and that everyone loves the presents you give them. I hope that all the food is perfectly cooked, and that everyone has the best time. But, above all, I pray that you will know the one who truly makes Christmas special - the child in the manger, Jesus who is Immanuel, God with us.

I wish you a happy Christmas and all God's blessings for 2023.





A New Presbytery and a New Beginning

On the 1st January 2023, the Presbytery of Aberdeen and Shetland will cease to be, and a new presbytery will come into being - the Presbytery of the North East and the Northern Isles.

As part of the ongoing reform

of the Church of Scotland, new larger Presbyteries are being formed across the country, reducing the number of Presbyteries from 44 to 12.

The new Presbytery of the North East and

Northern Isles will incorporate the former Presbyteries of Kincardine and Deeside, Aberdeen and Shetland, Gordon, Buchan, most of Moray, and Orkney. An area stretching from Laurencekirk in the South to Keith in the North and Braemar in the West, as well as including the Isles of Orkney and Shetland - a mixture of rural and urban, coastal and island.

The Rev. Elspeth McKay (pictured), a former probationer at South Holburn Church, will leave her current post

as minister of Paisley Abbey and become the new full time Presbytery Clerk based in a new presbyery office in Aberdeen.

Rev. McKay said, "I am very much looking

forward to returning to the North-East and to getting to know the Northern Isles a bit better. I'm also looking forward to meeting people as we forge the way ahead with the new Presbytery of the North East and the Northern Isles."



The new presbytery will be made up of all of the members of the current presbyteries and therefore will be much larger than many folk will be used to (350-400 members!). The Presbytery of the North East and the Northern Isles will meet five times per year, with three of those meetings taking place online and the other two meetings following a hybrid format with members meeting in person as well as others joining online.

The work of the new presbytery will, in part, be carried out by committees formed from the membership of the presbytery. The standing committees of the new presbytery will be: Church, Society, International Committee; Congregational Support Committee; Presbytery Planning and Deployment Committee; Property and Finance Committee; Training and **Development for Ministry** and Mission Committee. The convenors of each committee. along with other officals of presbytery, shall also serve on the Business Committee overseeing the work of the

presbytery. All of these committees will meet online for most of their meetings.

The first meeting of the new Presbytery of the North East and the Northern Isles will take place on 10th January 2023 and one of the first tasks will be to appoint a new moderator of the presbytery who will serve for a term of 2 years.

The reform of Presbytery was agreed at the 2019 General Assembly, with the intention of creating a simpler structure to enable the Church's work in reaching out to communities across the nation in the 21st Century. Already a number of new presbyteries have been formed: the Presbytery of the South West (the former Ardrossan, Irvine and Kilmarnock, Ayr, Wigtown and Stranraer, Annandale and Eskdale, and Dumfries and Kirkcudbright *Presbyteries)*; the Presbytery of Edinburgh and West Lothian; and the Presbytery of Forth Valley and Clydeside. Further new presbyteries will be formed in 2023, with the whole process of reform being completed by 2024.

A Christmas Recipe for Mulled Wine

Ingredients

- 1 large orange
- 3 lemons
- 12 cloves
- 2 satsumas or clementines
- 2 x 750ml bottles red wine
- 2 cinnamon sticks
- 150g caster sugar (optional)

Method

- 1.Carefully peel the zest very thinly from the orange and lemons using a vegetable peeler. Squeeze out the juice and reserve.
- 2. Stick the cloves into the satsumas.
- 3.Pour the wine, 1.2 litres/2 pints of cold water, and the citrus peel and juices into a large, heavy-based saucepan. Add the clove-studded satsumas and cinnamon sticks. Bring the mixture just to the boil, then reduce the heat until the mixture is simmering, cover the pan with the lid, and continue to simmer for about 1 hour. Stir in the sugar gradually during cooking, until the mulled wine is sweetened to your liking (you may not need all of the sugar).
- 4.Strain the mulled wine and serve hot in cups. ENJOY!!!!


